



Nova Scotia's Progress on Canada-Nova Scotia Aging with Dignity Funding Agreement (2023-24 to 2027-28) Targets

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In March 2024, Nova Scotia signed the [Canada-Nova Scotia Aging with Dignity Agreement](#) (“Bilateral Agreement”).

The five-year (2023-24 to 2027-28), \$145-million bilateral agreement includes funding designated to Home and Community Care initiatives (four years of funding, approximately \$15.7 million annually) and Long-Term Care initiatives (five years of funding, approximately \$16.5 million annually).

The Home and Community Care funding will continue to support investments made through the previous Home and Community Care and Mental Health and Addictions (HCCMHA) Bilateral Agreement to expand community-based supports and improve access to home care for seniors.

The Long-Term Care investment will provide five years of funding to support staffing in long-term care and the quality of care across the long-term care system by offsetting the significant investments that the province has already made in the sector.

Objectives of the bilateral agreement are:

- Improving access to home and community care services; and
- Supporting workforce improvements for long-term care and standards, to keep long-term care residents safe and to improve their quality of life.

Nova Scotia will be reporting annually on specific indicators, as identified in the bilateral agreement. The identified indicators are as follows:

- **Home and Community Care Targets (to be achieved annually)**
 - Total attendance of Brain Injury Association Programs and Training
 - Total participants in *U-First! For Healthcare* delivered by the Alzheimer Society of Nova Scotia
 - Number of clients participating in the ABI Day Program and Outreach teams
 - Percentage of long-term care facilities that have implemented interRAI-LTCF
- **Long-Term Care Targets (to be achieved by March 31, 2028)**
 - Total registered Continuing Care Assistants
 - Number of LTC facilities who have signed new service agreements

<p>Percentage of long-term care facilities that have implemented interRAI-LTCF</p> <p><i>Indicator Descriptor:</i></p> <p>AWD funding supports the implementation and ongoing management of the interRAI-LTCF, a person-centred assessment that evaluates the needs, strengths and preferences of those living in a LTC facility. Information from the assessment is used to identify areas for improvement and risks for a decline in health, well-being and function.
