Through Invest Nova Scotia, innovators and community leaders have been afforded the space, tools and technical resources to develop products and build stronger sectors and regions.


By supporting applicants who demonstrate a combination of proven leadership, financial capital and human capital, the projects are more economically competitive and sustainable for the long term.



# ABOUT THE INVEST NS FUND



Invest NS invests in passionate, innovative Nova Scotians with bold ideas. We are here to help bridge the gap between the idea, and that idea changing the world for the better.

We support innovative, collaborative projects that will improve Nova Scotia's competitiveness. Invest Nova Scotia helps sectors and communities become more competitive by funding projects that have a broad impact on a sector or geographic region in the province. The funding available can be distributed to organizations either as a grant, a no-interest loan, or both. The INS board supports collaborative projects that provide solutions to real needs in industry and regions while driving economic, community, and social impact.

### WHO ARE IDEAL APPLICANTS?

Successful applicants see the value in a collaborative approach to drive forward new economic, community, and social impact growth opportunities for their sectors or regions.

The INS funding application process is both rigorous and competitive. The board invests in projects that strongly align with the decision-making criteria and guiding principles. We believe in the projects we invest in and understand each project's contribution to not only the sector or region, but also the province.

An application must be submitted through a non-for-profit organization, municipality, post-secondary education institution, sector or industry association, or social enterprise. Although Invest Nova Scotia does not invest directly in individual businesses, there is an opportunity for a for-profit business to be a part of the partnership. Teaming up is a key part of the INS fund. The fund is designed to assist organizations that benefit the whole sector or region, including multiple stakeholders.

INS focuses on opportunities where proponents demonstrate the right combination of proven leadership, financial capital, and human capital in a project.



### **SECTOR-WIDE IMPACT**

Successful proposals to INS help develop or create widespread benefits for a sector or industry within Nova Scotia.



### MEANINGFUL INVESTMENTS

INS focuses on projects over \$250,000 to make a real difference for Nova Scotia's competitiveness in the global economy.

A prescribed set of seven specific decision-making criteria and guiding principles inform our decisions for approving applications. The board members have cross-sector experience and represent different regions in Nova Scotia. Such sectors include but are not limited to, energy, manufacturing, agriculture, retail, innovation ecosystem, and post-secondary education.



Cape Breton Centre for Craft & Design (the Centre), a non-profit charitable organization, is an integral and leading force in the educational, promotional, and economic development of the craft sector on Cape Breton Island. It has a membership of over 300 individuals and organizations across the island. The Centre was approved for a \$390,370 grant over a period of three years to support operations for the Customs House Incubator in Port Hawkesbury, Cape Breton. The space will include a retail outlet, demonstration space and space for craft courses. The project aims to attract crafters from outside Nova Scotia to re-locate to Cape Breton, increase sales of local crafts from local artisans and support the buy local movement in Cape Breton by enabling easier access to craft products in Cape Breton to residents and visitors.
